

IMPROVISED FIRST AID SKILLS (IFAS)

"STOPPING THE BLEED" CAN SAVE LIVES

In the rare event of a FIREARMS or WEAPONS attack;

- ▲ If you are at the scene, you should hide from the source of danger; and
- While hiding, if you encounter any casualty who is bleeding profusely, you should carry out IFAS by using commonly available items to stop the bleeding, without drawing any attention to yourself.

IFAS: PRESS » TIE » TELL



PRESS directly on the wound to stop the bleeding using items such as a handkerchief or cloth.



TIE above the wound using items such as a neck tie, belt or sling of a bag to stop any excessive bleeding.




TELL the SCDF Emergency Responders about the injury and the time when you tied the wound.



it more homely for her.



WO Hamid was browsing through the internet one day when he chanced upon an online deal on balloon sculpting. For just six dollars, he signed up!

Today, Nuwair Rizqin, his youngest child, has also became a fan of the balloon sculptures made by his father.

"It has been many years but my children continue to ask me to make balloon 'toys' for them. Their current favourites include the sword and gun. It warms my heart especially when I see them fall asleep with these 'toys' held closely", said WO Hamid

"One of the most unforgettable and meaningful balloon sculptures my husband made is a balloon wearable. Hamid made Nabil, our third child, a pair of wings for his 'show and tell' in school", said Marliana Rustamaji.

While the emergency responders attended to the boy, WO Hamid proceeded to calm the parents down with the hope of instilling a stronger sense of resilience and confidence in the boy.

"As parents, we must always be a pillar of support to our children. No matter how anxious we may be on the inside, we must never fail to be reassuring, especially in a crisis", WO Hamid said.

WO Hamid joined The Life Saving Force slightly more than a decade ago. He has since served at Ang Mo Kio Fire Station and Alexandra Fire Station.

While he has had years of experience in handling road traffic accidents which, at times, involved cutting up vehicles to rescue trapped casualties, overhauling a Harley Davidson was an art on a whole new level.


Armed with the service manual, a comprehensive toolbox and the knowledge that he acquired from online forums, SSG Hazwan carefully stripped down the components of his Sportster. He revealed humbly that it was to his surprise that he managed to accomplish the mission in a relatively short time.

SSG Hazwan explained that he had to first mentally decipher the parts to be replaced before he embarked on the project. This was possible because of his extensive riding experience and from paying attention to the sounds produced by the Sportster.

Just cranking up the engine after the overhaul and listening to the new "thump-thump" made it all worth the time and effort.

COL (Dr) Ng Yih Yng, SCDF's Chief Medical Officer, plays the role of an 'auditor' to keep our emergency medical services ahead of the curve. COL (Dr) Ng explained that the medical needs of our citizens are constantly changing and it is important that SCDF and his dynamic team visualise the possible changes and have plans in place ready to address those challenges.

COL (Dr) Yih Yng, a father to three daughters, also makes it a point to share similar interests with his children. Other than watching funky videos on YouTube and catching pokemon, he is also a fan of tapping incessantly on his mobile phone screen. But instead of Candy Crushing, COL (Dr) Yih Yng spends a great deal of his time playing with mobile applications that send users cardiac arrest alerts and the list of AEDs nearby the vicinity as well as mobile applications that coach users on how to do CPR using the accelerometer.

The nights he spent tapping on the brightly lit mobile phone screen also inspired him to create a crowdsourcing geospatial mobile application to "fill the possible gaps". After months of idea pitching and sheer determination, the myResponder mobile application was launched in 2015. This idea has since been operationalised and has on numerous occasions, saved lives.

COL (Dr) Yih Yng casually revealed that he thoroughly enjoys his work and on weekends when he is not required in the office, he will be marinating an assortment of meats and cooking up a storm in his kitchen.

"When we first got married, we lived in a tiny apartment. Even though we lacked space and furniture, Yih Yng never failed to ensure that our kitchen was always stocked up with food supplies", Ho Whei Chern, COL (Dr) Yih Yng's wife said.

Whei Chern also revealed that when they finally moved into a bigger apartment, COL (Dr) Yih Yng had an idea to build a kiln in the house as he wanted to bake pizza doughs.

"I nearly fainted but I told Yih Yng to go ahead with his idea because I know how in love he is with cooking and his fascination with cooking instruments and gadgets", Whei Chern said jokingly.

Over the past 14 years, he has been a proud owner of three

charcoal grills and three gas grills.

He bought his first portable charcoal grill when he was studying in America, which he also hand-carried all the way back to Singapore after graduation. It was definitely worth the hassle as it served him well for over a decade even though COL (Dr) Yih Yng had to constantly get it repaired due to wear and tear.

Years later, COL (Dr) Yih Yng convinced his friend who

ASIAN BEER CAN CHICKEN RECIPE



- Step 1 Wash and clean a full-sized chicken
- Step 2 Pat dry and rub some dark soy sauce and sesame oil on the chicken including the inner cavity
- **Step 3** Let the excess drip off if required
- **Step 4** Season the chicken skin with five spice powder
- Step 5 Marinate for at least one hour before cooking or if possible, half a day or one day ahead of time
- **Step 6** Open 1 can of beer (or coke as a substitute)
- **Step 7** Fit the chicken over the can of beer that is one-third filled
- Step 8 Cook for approximately 1 hour over indirect heat in a covered grill
- Step 9 Drippings and leftover beer can be boiled down and thickened with corn starch mixed with water to form a thick gravy

Munawar Bin Zainudin spent his childhood working as a kitchen helper at his parents' nasi padang food stall. Since the age of 7, he learned through his personal experience the importance of hard work and of course, acquired a liking for good food.


any purchase. In doing so, it will help prevent the support of coffee products that were produced through unethical means.

CPT Shafi researched and found out that the coffee cherries actually form a very small part of the civet cat's diet. As such, some producers of Kopi Luwak have gone to the extent of trapping the civet cats in narrow slats of crude bamboo cages and force feeding them with coffee cherries.
